Description

Ann Arbor Unitarian Universalists for Justice in the Middle East (AA-UUJME) is one of 27 chapters across the county that are part of the 51-year-old <u>UUs for Justice in the Middle East</u> (UUJME) organization. We advocate for freedom, justice and equality for all people living in the Middle East with a particular focus on Palestine/Israel. Lasting peace requires an end to Israeli military rule, colonization and occupation of Palestinian territories; the right of refugees to return; and equal rights for Israel's Palestinian citizens.

Activities

With input from the UUAA Board and fellow congregants, our activities this year reflected a decision to set aside a congregational resolution endorsing the Palestinian-led Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions movement (BDS) that we had proposed in 2019 so that we could provide more opportunities for learning and discussion.

- Panel discussion with Jewish activists working for Palestinian rights that featured representatives from <u>Jewish Voice for Peace-Detroit</u>, <u>Eyewitness Palestine</u> and <u>Students</u> <u>United for Palestinian Equal Rights</u> (Univ. of Washington, Seattle).
- Displayed "<u>Promised Land: Jewish Museum of the Palestinian Experience</u>". The exhibit provides a Jewish perspective rooted in Jewish values to treat our neighbors as we would want to be treated (a project of Voices for Justice in Palestine, Durham, NC).
- The national UUJME organization is a lead organizer of <u>Voices from the Holy Land</u> film series, which showcases independent films about Palestine/Israel by Palestinian and Jewish filmmakers.
- Action Alerts to Congress and Biden Admin. posted to UUAA Newsletters:
 - 1. <u>Defending 6 Palestinian Community and Human Rights Organizations</u> falsely declared "terrorist organizations" by the Israeli Military
 - 2. Opposing forced displacement of over 1000 Palestinians from Masafer Yatta, a city in the West Bank

Goals for Next Year

Lead UUAA members in a process of learning and deciding what actions we can take as a community to support the Palestinian people. If the congregation decides on a resolution supporting Palestinian human rights, members of the community will have opportunities to provide input on the content and wording of the resolution.
