

	Activities planned this year	We host families who are temporarily living at Alpha House four times per year. During our week volunteers are asked to bring a dish or heat up a meal in the shelter or to oversee children's activities after dinner. Volunteers can also donate to support our purchase of groceries and supplies which is directed by the staff of IHN at Alpha House.

Oppression Confronted	Habitat for Humanity was born more than 40 years ago on a farm in southern Georgia built on the principle of radical, racial inclusivity; this remains a core guiding principle in Habitat's work today. Black families comprise 40% of the total families we assist in becoming homeowners. Non-white households as a whole comprise two-thirds. We further invest in communities of color by helping revitalize the neighborhoods where we work through inclusive, asset-based neighborhood development, cooperative partnerships and local leadership development.  Recruit and organize volunteers to help build quality, energy-efficient housing in Washtenaw County, raise money to help finance these houses, and publicize Habitat's housing policy strategies for remedying unequal conditions and opportunities for Black households so that everyone can thrive.

	Activities planned this year	We are developing a reentry ministry for women being released from Women's Huron Valley Correctional Facility in Ypsilanti. We are supporting 10 previously incarcerated citizens to be trained as Restorative Justice Facilitators in Washtenaw County. This will support the new county prosecutor in his goal to decrease incarceration rates. Six members of the group will attend the National Association of Community Restorative Justice conference in July 2022 in Chicago and have submitted an abstract to present there on the collaboration of community partners with our faith-based organization.

	Communities Supported	Palestinians, 60% of whom are refugees, living in the West Bank, Gaza Strip, State of Israel, refugee camps in adjacent countries and other countries around the world.		
	Oppression Confronted	8 million stateless Palestinians are denied the basic human rights to a nationality and self-determination. Palestinian citizens and residents in Israel experience systemic racism and discrimination. Palestinians living under military occupation in the West Bank and an ille military siege/blockade in Gaza are denied basic hum rights, as are stateless Palestinians living in refugee camps in adjacent countries.		
	Activities planned this year	Inform members of UUAA about Israeli violations of Palestinian human rights. Host discussions about actions we can take as individuals and as a congregation to support the Palestinian struggle for freedom and equality. Encourage members of UUAA to lobby Congress to support legislation and U.S. Middle East policies that prioritizes human rights. Consider a congregational resolution supporting the Palestinian Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) movement.
