Anti-racism/ dismantling white supremacy; LGBTQ rights, especially gender nonconforming and trans justice; Environmental and climate justice, organic garden, etc.
We are active and engaged, including and beyond study groups and lectures.

Diverse and varied styles of services, sermons and music that reflect the membership now and where the congregation hopes to be in 20 years: Thoughtful and heartfelt; early and late; virtual and in person; meaningful rituals and academic; active, challenging and reflective.

Deepen and develop strategies and programs to create a diverse congregation that mirrors Washtenaw County's demographics. Opportunities for connection and relationshipbuilding through small groups, worship, SGD and social events. Active outreach and communications efforts to raise our profile, grow and attract younger and more racially and ethnically diverse membership

Decentralized, shared, transparent and impactful leadership and decision making at all levels. Leadership is diverse, includes youth and young adults, and we provide training and support for consensus decision making and conflict management.

We have an attitude of abundance: Our size, talent, dedication, wealth, land and buildings are our resources, and we pursue traditional and creative funding sources for financial stability and congregational wellbeing.

Lay led services that meet the needs of the whole congregati on Building and Land additions: Larger social hall, balcony, enlarge choir loft, retreat center on property, commercial kitchen, etc.

Small and large group programming: Lecture series, events, classes, services and activities- focused on covenant, conflict resolution, proud history of UUAA & UUA, promoting UU principles and values for congregation and to bring in community members

Maintain a diverse, fair-compensated staff, including a full-time social and environmental justice coordinator

Music, poetry, readings, lockins, and other cultural, social and family friendly events, with food Outreach in partnership with other churches, online, in campus publications, and other mechanisms Green as possible, coordinated climate action efforts with partners, energy independent, experimental organic agriculture, Tesla chargers, etc.
