Are You a Trained Middle School OWL Facilitator? We Need You!

Sundays at 11:30am starting in January (or sooner if possible)

One of the cornerstones of our Spiritual Growth and Development Program is "Our

Whole Lives" (OWL), a sexuality education program for youth that models and teaches caring, compassion, respect, and justice. It is a holistic program that moves beyond the intellect to address the attitudes, values, and feelings that youth have about themselves and the world.



We usually offer OWL to 8th graders as a full academic year course; this year we are hoping to put together a teaching team by January. Because teaching OWL requires participation in a comprehensive training and those trainings are currently scarce due to Covid, we need to recruit from our existing pool of trained OWL teachers. Two teachers have already committed, so we only need two more.

All-Congregation Climate Engagement Survey

UUAA's "Vision 20/50" asks all of us - kids, teens, and adults - to engage deeply with the pressing climate issues of our times. How can we, as a religious organization, help create a

more just and sustainable world?

To help guide our climate action and climate justice work, UUAA is enrolled in the Green Sanctuary 2030 certification program provided by the Unitarian Universalist Association. One of our first tasks is to survey the congregation to get a snapshot of our levels of climate concern and engagement as we begin the certification process. This is NOT a scientific survey, but meant to be a general picture of our congregation today. There are no "right" or "good" or "bad" answers.

We ask that everyone of all ages submit answers to the survey -- It usually takes less than 10 minutes to complete:

Decline to Sign!

Michigan's 2020 election was deemed safe and secure by <u>Secretary of State</u> Jocelyn Benson and a <u>State</u> <u>Senate Oversight Committee</u>, but a new petition drive seeks to enact changes that would negatively affect voting accessibility and support. A Republican-

backed group, Secure MI Vote, needs to gather 340,000 signatures in 180 days.

If the signature drive is successful, the Michigan legislature will then likely adopt the initiative rather than let it appear on a ballot where voters would decide. Tell your friends and family not to sign! Here's a Bridge Magazine summary of the proposed changes.

9:30am - 11:00am, 11:30am - 1:00pm, and 1:30pm - 3:00pm


The sessions will build on each other, and everyone at UUAA is encouraged to attend as many sessions as they are able.

Extravaganza. This year's dinner and activities will all be outside, so dress for the weather.


Come in costume!




November Sharing the Collection
