From Rev. Manish: Feedback Sessions Regarding UUAA's Acting Directors – Your Input Is Needed

<u>Tuesday, March 1, 10:30am - noon</u> (regarding our Acting Director of Music)

<u>Wednesday, March 23, 7:00pm - 8:00pm</u> <u>(regarding our Acting Director of Spiritual Growth and Development</u>)

Two of UUAA's current staff members—Stella Anderson and Carter Smith each hold the title of "Acting Director" of the Spiritual Growth and Development Program and of Music Ministries, respectively. As has been previously shared with our community, UUAA has many options before us, which include possibilities such as making either or both of our Acting Directors the hired Director for their respective programs, extending the "Acting" positions for a second year, and/or entering intentional search processes, among other options. While all staffing decisions ultimately lie with the senior minister, UUAA's Personnel Working Group is helping gather intentional feedback from our community members to help better inform how we will move forward. This is your chance to participate, and your participation matters! If you LOVE how our Acting Directors are leading their respective programs, please do not assume that each of them are going to be the permanent hire. (Either/both may not be.) If you have guestions or reservations about either/both Acting Directors, please do not assume that it will all get worked out in some larger search process. (There might not be one.) Community members are strongly encouraged to participate in this intentional feedback and assessment process—what we hear from the community, collectively, will directly support how UUAA proceeds with permanent staffing. Why Are We Starting Our Conversation on Palestinian Rights with a Panel of Jewish Activists?

So, we are kicking off our learning journey with a panel of Jewish activists who will share their personal stories of how their views of Israel/Palestine have changed over the years, why they got involved in advocating for Palestinian rights, and what it has meant in their lives. "Invisible Wounds: Healing Moral Injuries" Sundays, February 27, March 27, & April 24 7:00pm-8:30pm

Join us for this three-session virtual series, jointly developed by the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor and the First Unitarian

Church of Rochester, NY, in which we will learn from the experiences of military vets, hear how trauma and moral injury can impact our lives, and explore some of the paths that can support subsequent healing.

February 27: Leroy, an Iraq War veteran, and Yaroub, an Iraqi immigrant and designer, speak about healing from their respective traumas and their project of building the first mudhif (a traditional structure for community ceremonies and gatherings) outside Iraq.

March 27: Siren, a Global War-on-Terror veteran and a spoken-word poet who has used creativity, art, and poetry as a way to work with and heal from trauma, will speak about their experience seeking healing since being home.

April 24: Rev. AJ van Tine, assistant minister of First Unitarian Church of Rochester, and Rev. Jared Dilley, a military chaplain with the Michigan National Guard and a congregant with the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor, will facilitate conversation reflecting on the content of the first two sessions, exploring how individuals and communities can support individual and collective healing in service to those who have experienced trauma and/or moral injury.
