

The birds don't seem to mind. They flutter off when the deer approach. They settle back as the deer move away. The small birds do, however, mind terribly the abrupt appearances of the Cooper's Hawk. They scatter in a flash when the hawk comes to feed. How on earth the Cardinals survive in winter eludes me utterly. They are so red! So crisply visible against the grey-brown trees and the white of snow.

The ground is silent and snow covered. Winter seems not to move. But the sun has a different tale to tell. The steady pulsing of sunrise shows us to be in constant motion. The light of mornings may have been covered by clouds, whited out by squalls of snow, or rendered feeble by earth's distance from the sun. But it has been there.

More on Building Trust

You may have noticed that I have a fairly regular habit of offering suggestions in this newsletter column for how groups and individuals in groups can use church experiences to grow and develop. Last month I pointed out some ways that we build trust with each other. Here are some more reminders and an invitation to consider the need for trust in our wider community, which I will explore more fully in my March 3 sermon.



Trust is an essential quality in a healthy community and for a healthy person. We learn and promote trust in a church group when we do simple things like wear our name tags, and have a

plan for the meeting whether it's a formal agenda or just a simple routine way of conducting our time together. We promote trust when we listen to each other without interrupting and check with the speaker to be sure we heard accurately what they meant to convey. We promote trust when we make our decisions all together in the open and then follow through on what we decided. We do well often to make a written record of our decisions. We can each review the written record of our decisions and together we can confirm that we are doing what we said we would do, revisit decisions as needed, or make corrections to get back on track when we go astray.

The trust essential to sharing a meaningful life together seems to be growing scarcer in our wider world. A recent Gallup poll shows significant declines in our trust in the Congress, banks, the U. S. Supreme Court, the Presidency, newspapers, public schools, and organized labor. Our life together in this congregation can be a place where we keep alive skills that build trust with each other. Our life together in this congregation can keep alive in our hearts the courage and vision of our forebears so that we can rebuild the many institutions that are now threatened and build new institutions and ways of relating that will meet our needs in future years. How can your participation in our congregational groups help make this so?


