Gleanings Reflections from Rev. Gail R. Geisenhainer, Senior Minister

Dear Ones, All,

In the urgency of now, headlines scream about declining interest in mainline Christian churches. Pundits declare that virtual church, on-line streaming video will replace the worn old practices of gathering on Sunday mornings. What do you think?

April 12th I will be preaching from my own vision of the next 150 years of this Congregation. There will be a forum to engage what we are calling the "Big Questions." Some of those are about:

- the future of bricks and mortar church in the 21st century
- the future on Unitarian Universalist
- to which ministries shall we give our all
- which ministries shall we retire.
- how must our church change to survive, or to thrive



For my part, I agree with the statistics on church attendance decline, although I question their accuracy for what we offer here in Ann Arbor as Unitarian Universalism. Our numbers are stable. And I agree with the pundits and prophets who predict we will continue to see bullish growth in the uses and presence of electronic communications. Though I flat out disagree with the conclusion that all our virtual, electronic, instant and hand-held connecting will ever replace or displace the power and purpose of gathering together to sing, to celebrate, to mourn, lament, marry, grow and learn: face to face. Hugging and singing, hearing the sound of one another's voices from the pulpit or while sharing a donut and coffee..., all that is much, much too important to what makes spiritual growth, effective public witness, social change and purposeful lives possible.

Also, I'm wondering what experiences you all are having while wearing the buttons "Black Lives Matter?" For my part, the responses have been heart-felt, positive, and encouraging. I am routinely thanked for wearing the button. I hear, "I like your button. "What are you hearing? April 5th, 1pm, our Challenging Racism Group is hosting another "Open Discussion About Race." All are welcome to drop by and chat about experiences wearing the buttons and other reflections about race and racism.

I continue to believe that we are in a unique moment in history. I think portals of understanding and effectiveness are opening through which we can move to partner in significant social change on race and racism. As the hymn invites.., "Come! And Go With Me to That Land!"

Change and Transition

Dear members and friends of UUAA,

It is with significant sadness yet abiding gratitude as well as confidence in our futures that I write to inform you that I am resigning my position as Associate Minister at the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor. I arrived at this decision after much reflection and discernment, and in deep consultation with Rev. Gail. My discernment has led me to realize that, at present, continuing in congregational ministry is not a fit for me and my family.



When I arrived, this Congregation needed to build its capacity to function as a large church. Since I began serving here in September of 2008, we have accomplished a lot together. We have matured and expanded the Chalice Circles small group ministry program. Together we have developed a dedicated team of pastoral care assistants, a pastoral care education program, a memorial reception support team, strengthened channels for sharing pastoral news within the cVongregation, and developed a program of senior lunches.

We have developed a strong Men's Council that sustains a vibrant program of men's groups, an annual dinner, an annual retreat, and service projects for the Congregation. Interweave, our LGBTQQA and allies group, has continued to blossom, with steady Social Hall presence, regular social and program events, the annual December Service of Remembrance, and advocacy of equal rights in the community.

We now have a Congregational Map and a Recognized Groups List to help Congregational groups align with the Congregation's mission and help communicate to all the workings of the Congregation as a large system.

At this point the Congregation needs a different balance of talents from the Associate Minister. The skills and capacities you need now and into the future do not fit the ministry I can provide.

The effective date of my resignation is not yet set. Rev. Gail and I are in a continuing

conversation about how to best support the needs of the Congregation during this transition. I am now in search for my next professional position. My expectation is that I will return to the field of technical communication which was my vocation before I was called into ministry. If I am able to stay in Ann Arbor, this Congregation will be my family's religious community.

It has been a privilege and an honor to work with you, to be with you pastorally in your times of need, and to serve our faith tradition with you. As our relationship shifts, I look forward to helping you prepare to welcome new staff with whom you will write the next chapters of this Congregation's excellent history of reason and compassion in action.

Children's Ministry Team (CMT) by Lisa Kohn



The Children's Ministry Team develops, supports, envisions, and evaluates the Spiritual Growth and Development (SGD) programs for pre-school through 5th grade. Under the guidance of the SGD Director, members of the committee serve as coordinators for specific classrooms and provide support to the SGD director and teachers. One essential function of the group is the recruitment of SGD teachers.

Gregg Peterson and I are nearing the completion of our terms (2 ½ yrs) on the CMT and are seeking candidates who want to contribute and nurture the SGD programs for our youngest

congregants. Serving on this group has given me a bigger view of our Congregation and an appreciation of our interdependent parts.

It is not necessary to have been an SGD teacher in order to join the CMT. Desired characteristics include a commitment to facilitate learning for our kids, willingness to work on targeted small projects, and ability to foster good relationships with teachers and families. Time involvement includes a one hour meeting per month and some additional time of 2-10 hours per month depending on the project.

Calling Teachers For Next Fall

April begins the kick-off of teacher recruitment for the fall 2015. Sharing UU teachings and traditions with the youth is a deeply meaningful spiritual practice. I've had the privilege of working with 2nd and 3rd graders this year in the curriculum called "Peacemakers". Some of the topics in the many lessons include how to find hidden commonalities in others, how to thwart green poison darts (negative or critical comments) and how to recognize and resolve conflict. It has been pure joy witnessing the wisdom and problem-solving skills of the children. There is no doubt, as other SGD teachers can attest to, that there is reciprocal learning happening in the classrooms.

Each SGD class enjoys a four-person teaching team. The co-teachers alternate classroom responsibilities with each teacher leading one class per month and assisting one class per month. This system allows the teachers and children to build relationships throughout the year. Congregants who have participated in this Congregation for at least one year are eligible to serve as teachers.

While considering the possibility of becoming a children's or youth SGD teacher, know that each will be well supported with the Children's and Youth Ministry Teams and with the rich curriculum of the programming.

Digging into the history of the UUSC Coffee Project at UUAA uncovers unsung heroes and twists in the path toward the UUAA Coffee Project's status as one of the largest purchasers of Equal Exchange products nationwide. In 2012, this team led the pack: top purchaser of all UU congregations.

How did this come to be? It begins with Unsung Heroes, Marion Hart and Sue Tons. Plot Twists: Marion Hart and Sue Tons decided to donate profits from the sale of Equal Exchange products at UUAA to Fundacion Ninos Sanos (Foundation for Healthy Children) in Ecuador where Sue had relatives. Eventually, it became difficult to guarantee the money would get to medical facilities there. Enter the UUSC, the Unitarian Connie Fredrick (left) and Marion Hart Universalist Service Committee, which had (right) celebrate Marion's 91st birthday begun a partnership with Equal Exchange. In 2001, Marion and the Congregation began working directly with the UUSC to support sustainable livelihoods, education, and health care around the world.

Who benefits from profits? First, those who grow the products get fair payment. Second, Equal Exchange donates 20 cents from every pound of product sold to the UUSC's Small Farmer Fund, which supports farmer cooperatives worldwide. Third, the church also gets a percentage. That's money well spent.

Now the UUSC Coffee Project committee sells coffee, tea, chocolate, dried fruits, and nuts in the Social Hall every Sunday, after every service. Jenny Kropf and Shireen Jones (present-day unsung heroes) coordinate purchasing products, stocking the cabinet, and scheduling who will work at the Coffee Project table. Volunteers are invited to join the committee of 10.

UUSC's Water Projects

Water is essential to human life. Yet, almost three-quarters of a billion people around the world lack clean drinking water. The United Nations has reported that more people



now die from contaminated water than from all forms of violence. The human right to water - access to safe, sufficient, and affordable water for everyone - is more important than ever.

The UUSC defends and promotes the human right to water by working with grassroots groups and activists to push for new laws, challenge violations, and create new models for implementation. Acting on the moral responsibility this issue demands, UUSC is on the cutting edge of ensuring that the human right to water is recognized in principle and becomes a reality.

UUSC collaborates with innovative groups that protect water resources and increase access to services in law and practice. Recognizing that too many people are denied the human right to water because of discriminatory policies and procedures, UUSC puts special focus on working with marginalized populations.

Access to water shouldn't depend on race or bank account. The good news is that, despite increasing environmental challenges, there is enough water for everyone's basic needs. And protecting the human right to water is entirely compatible with protecting the environment. UUSC envisions a sustainable future in which all people have access to water for basic human needs, and where water supplies are safe from industrial contamination, over-extraction, and climate change.
