Dear Ones, All,

What is a Consulting Minister? Something new for our Congregation, to be sure. The Unitarian Universalist Association Ministerial Transitions Office folks refine the language we use for ministries every several years. This keeps us flexible and current with the changing needs of congregations. As with so many things, it is more simple to define what a thing is not, than it is to define what it is.

The UUA Transitions Manual offers this, "practically speaking, any ministry that is designed to last longer than a few months and is neither interim nor called is a

consulting ministry."Lindasusan Ulrich is, now, our Consulting Minister. In parlance more familiar to our own history, the position is an Assistant Minister position. Hired not called. Reports to the Senior Minister.

This year, the position is also 'consulting' to the Senior Minister. It is both-and. Lindasusan is here to assist me in the regular and broad duties and expectations of parish ministry. She is also tasked with consulting with me on the massive staff changes we now have the opportunity to make.

In her beginning weeks, I asked Lindasusan to write down anything that she found surprising.., good news or sad. We are using her "fresh eyes" and new-to-us perspectives to assist me in directing the refreshments and refinements needed to streamline our staff toward the end of providing an operating system that is both sustainable and affordable.

Much of her current focus has been in collaboration with me and our Director of Worship, Music, and Arts, Glen Thomas Rideout. We are working to increase the number of voices in our worship services. We are working to structure and build a lay

Worship Associates program to much more deeply involve laity in the crafting and presentation of worship. Over the next few months I think the work of our Consulting/Assistant Minister will be more visible. She is preaching September 27 and October 4. I hope you will come and support her pulpit work on those days.

November 15, after second Service, is the next President+Senior Minister Q+A session. We will be in Jackson Chapel to offer time for any and all questions you may have about our Congregation. I look forward to chatting with you then if you have more questions for me.

Truly, I wish I had a giant banner to hang up over the Congregational Map and Organization Chart that hangs in the office hall way. Yes, it is whimsical.., but, it is also Oh-So-True! I would have it read: UNDER CONSTRUCTION! We are working to build a stronger UUAA, a vital UUAA, an affordable and deeply sustainable Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor that will bring our salvific and transformative messages of Love and Service boldly into the generations to come.

Upon Reflection Lindasusan Ulrich, Consulting Minister

I've just returned from a whirlwind trip to Washington, DC, where I was part of a group of bisexual activists making policy recommendations to the White House. I was honored to be one of the panelists speaking on behalf of the bi community and to be in a room full of brilliant, diverse, dedicated advocates from around the country who are working ceaselessly to improve people's lives. (If you're interested in learning more about the major disparities that bi people face, I was the principal author on a groundbreaking report published by the San Francisco Human Rights Commission a few years ago.)



Given how many LGBTQ people have been wounded by those who spew hateful rhetoric in the name of religion, it was especially important to me to show up in my ministerial collar. This was my first public witness event in clergy garbhey, go big or go home - and it couldn't have been more timely. After the meeting itself, our group went outside for an impromptu gathering in front of the White House. There, we happened upon two men with microphones and large signs filled with some of those less-than-loving words. I don't know whether they noticed me standing between them sporting both the collar and a bi pride flag, but it lifted my heart to think that someone passing by might see me. Perhaps someone longing to acknowledge their true identity, or someone struggling to reconcile their faith with a loved one's identity. My visible presence had power in that setting.

I'm equally aware of the power that Unitarian Universalists can wield as a religious community. We have the potential to heal across differences that have too often become divisions. We can push back against the notion that religion can only do damage, or that spiritual people have forsaken reason, or that making the path to peace narrow is better than flinging the gates wide open. Our presence can offer a

lifeline to people trying to make sense of their place in the world.

General Assembly (GA) is the annual meeting of the Unitarian Universalist Association. Attendees worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through the democratic process. Anyone may attend. The 2016 GA will be held from Wednesday to Sunday, June 22-26 in Columbus, OH. Most GA events will be held in the Greater Columbus Convention

Center, less than 200 miles from Ann Arbor.

The theme will be "Heart Land: Where Faiths Connect." The faith world is increasingly becoming multi-faith oriented. People are crossing borders of religion and spiritual practice to create wholeness in their lives individually and collectively. Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) News



Help the UUSC and UUA respond to the current refugee crisis. The UUSC's President Rev. Bill Schulz and UUA President Rev. Peter Morales issued a joint statement announcing two new initiatives in response to the ongoing refugee crisis: a special **UUSC-UUA**

Refugee Crisis Fund, with the goal of quickly raising \$250,000; and a petition drive to pressure the Obama administration to raise the number of refugees admitted into the United States to 200,000.

Donations to the UUSC-UUA Refugee Crisis Fund will go directly to partners operating on the ground in countries receiving refugees. Work will focus on ensuring the safe passage of refugees and helping refugees access their rights in host countries.

The UUSC-UUA joint statement explains why the US must raise the general refugee admission ceiling to accommodate the growing number of people seeking asylum from Syria and other countries in crisis. It states, "This is a simple policy change that will have a huge impact. Right now, 11 million Syrians have been forced to leave their homes after four years of civil war. Worldwide, an estimated 60 million people have been displaced, leading to the largest crisis of forced displacement since World War II."

Since 2013, the AT has provided a voice for people with disabilities. Under founding leader Els Nieuwenhuijsen, the AT has responded to accessibility and inclusion needs as a first priority. Many projects and much good stem from this beginning.

UUAA is a pilot site congregation for the national UUA AIM program. As one of the first few in the nation, the AT now works in worship services, workshops, projects, and social justice actions in order to qualify to apply for the UUA AIM certificate this coming winter.

Interfaith Service of Affirmation

"Are you woke? Stay Woke". This was the admonition to the crowd at a rally a few weeks ago on the University of Michigan Diag in support of Trans Women of Color. This Congregation celebrated a huge victory for marriage equality in June, but other civil rights are not yet assured for all LGBTQI folk. UUs must continue to stand up in support of Trans people in the struggle for acceptance and legal protection.

Hanging on to this awareness, continuing to show support, and striving to be allies will keep the community "woke". Will the Congregation stand up for Trans people who risk their lives daily? In a society in which fixed, binary gender is entwined, how can one wake up?

One method is for cis-gendered (those who identify with the biological gender with which they were born) to better understand what the Trans experience is like. To begin this journey, consider reading the memoir of Trans woman Jennifer Finney Boylan called *She's Not There: A Life in Two Genders*. In the book, Jennifer describes her life journey toward accepting and then claiming her inner gender. In addition to Jennifer's story, consider reading the afterword of the memoir, written by Jennifer's best friend and novelist Richard Rousseau. Rousseau describes his experience walking with his friend Paul Boylan as he made his transition.
