In the Interim Rev. Dr. Doug Wadkins, Senior Interim Minister



We move into December with a certain palpable gravitas. I know that for the majority of you the past few weeks have been a time of deep trepidation or worse. While we are too close-in to know the deeper truths of what this time will mean for our lives, our country, and the world, I think it is important for us to take in that many of you fear for your safety and for the well-being of your children. I am certain that has never been my

sentiment in December, but we must hold that truth and attend to it. I think that this moment transcends labels like liberal or conservative, Republican, Democrat, or other; or even to some extent race, class, and privilege. We are in a moment that urgently compels us to step beyond and beneath divisions, as hard as that can be in such a scary time. It is especially crucial that we build bridges to those most vulnerable to the bullying and other violence that this time is encouraging. We must foster common ground with people of good will. I believe those connections are the pathway to living our values, and in the process, preserving the true core values of this country.

I also think that this December is time for soulful inner work. As my reflections on

November 20 offered, this a season to do life-affirming and proactive work: to wait, to watch, and to prepare. To wait with an intentional sense of agency that creates an air of expectancy that refuses to let go of our heart. We must not accept a reality where compassion, civility, and basic human decency disappear from our shared experience in this country. We must watch; we must notice what is happening around us, as hard as it may be. We must not turn away from what is unfolding. We will need each other's support to witness faithfully. For we are not passively spectating but rather seeking to see what is true and letting that truth change us. Finally, we must prepare ourselves to know what we are to do. Each of us will find our way to inner wisdom and outer service and activism. It may be protest, or community building, or small acts of compassion, but we each have our own path to redeeming the coming days. I am grateful for the ways that our community will help shape this work. I am grateful, that while our time together has not been long, that I am with you in this anxious but transformative time. I am truly holding each of you with love. In this time may our community strengthen, inspire, and comfort you.

If you've seen me since November 10, you may have noticed that I look a bit different these days - specifically, I've shaved my head. People have been understandably curious what this change is about.

First, let me tell you what it's not.

Thankfully, I'm not sick. As far as I know, I don't have cancer, and I'm not undergoing chemo.

Also, I didn't shave my head out of anger. Certainly, I'm angry that the President-Elect is an ill-prepared charlatan who peddled hatred and lies and bigotry. And I'm angry that the rhetoric he used during the campaign has emboldened assaults against people in marginalized communities. I'm also angry that his top advisors and Cabinet nominees seem to be pulled directly from the League of Supervillains.

But the decision to shave my head came from a deeper place, a loving place that has called me to embody more fearlessness. While the immediate stakes are fairly low - after all, my hair has already started to grow out again - I've noticed how I carry myself differently now.

Every time I run my hand over my skull, I'm reminded that we've entered a drastically different moment in human history. Every time I catch sight of myself in the mirror, I remember that more will be asked of me in the weeks and years ahead if I'm serious about living into my core commitments of justice, compassion, and love.

What does fearlessness look like for you?

Recent Annual Budget Campaign Results

As 2016 draws to a close, so does the preparation of the 2017 budget. In the last two newsletter articles, sources of income and categories of expenditure were discussed. Given those snapshots of income and expenditures, it seems appropriate to provide historical perspective on the Annual Budget Campaign (the source of the vast majority of UUAA income). The Figure below illustrates Annual Budget Campaign income for each of the five years prior to 2017 (2016 is projected, but a value with high confidence given only 5 weeks remaining in the calendar year). Note that the result for 2015 includes a "second ask," which was required to alleviate a budget shortfall of \$192,000. For a little perspective on the coming year, it may help to know that the proposed 2017 budget will probably end up around \$920,000.

UUAA Governance Tune-up in Progress

What might help this congregation do more and be more? How can we best attract outstanding Senior Minister candidates when we begin our ministerial search next year? These questions inspire the members of the Governance Task Force (GTF) that has been charged by the Board of Trustees to review UUAA's governance structure, including the Senior Minister's job description. It has been 8 years since we implemented Policy Governance, and we have learned a lot since then. Time to step back to revisit what works well and what needs changing. We will be asking for your input during the next few months. The GTF Vision Statement reads:

"The First Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Ann Arbor elects a Board to serve as its governing body and calls a Senior Minister to serve as its spiritual, programmatic, and administrative leader. UUAA currently governs with a shared leadership governance structure that tasks the Board with setting the vision for the future of the congregation and gives the Senior Minister responsibility for directing implementation of that vision. The Senior Minister operates within limitations defined by Board policies that assure that the congregation's money, property, and people are kept safe

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and that the congregation lives in harmony with its values.

The 2016-017 Governance Task Force, reviewing UUAA's current governance policies and procedures, will recommend changes that would:

- Clarify responsibilities for decision-making.
- Improve processes the Board uses to monitor the health and well-being of the congregation and its progress toward fulfilling the vision and mission of UUAA.
- Establish processes that would have the Board spend more of its time discerning the vision for the long-term future of the congregation.
- Better define a clear and achievable role for the Senior Minister in leading the congregation and staff toward the fulfillment of UU principles and UUAA core values.
- Provide materials that clearly explain to the congregation and staff how governance works at UUAA.

The GTF proposes the following vision for leadership at UUAA:

"UUAA leaders are consultative, collegial, and inclusive. Clarity about ultimate responsibility and authority exists along with a democratic and egalitarian spirit. All UUAA leaders practice transparent decision-making, healthy conflict management, and mutual support in their respective roles."

Our K-1 class continues to venture into our great outdoors and even enjoyed tossing the Earth (ball) around in their "World of Wonder" class. CROP Hunger Walk 2016

This year the Interfaith Council for Peace & Justice hosted its 41st Annual Washtenaw/Ann Arbor CROP Hunger Walk on Sunday, September 25. CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by religious groups, businesses, schools, and others to raise funds to end hunger in the U.S. and around



the world. 75% of funds raised will be granted to Church World Service and their partner agencies. The remaining 25% will be granted to various local hunger and poverty relief organizations. This year, with 300 people participating, \$30,000 was donated on the day of the walk. This year the First Unitarian Universalist Congregation contributed \$5,765 to the annual CROP Walk. A Pilgrimage to the Other Side of the World



Representing all of the "Big Hearts" (a name given by the Khasis to those among us who sponsor students at the primary school in Mawkisyiem) and carrying letters from them to the students they sponsor, a small group from the Ann Arbor congregation recently undertook a pilgrimage to northeast India.

In mid-October Allen Duncan, Cathie and Hal Breidenbach, Rick Johnson, and Cathy Doherty traveled to the Khasi Hills to visit the students and teachers at the Unitarian Lower Primary School in Mawkisyiem, which our congregational Sponsor-a-Student program has supported for 15 years. They were joined by Mark and Nancy Kinney from the UU Congregation of Petoskey.

The group also visited the Children's Village, an orphanage for Khasi Unitarian children and youth, spent time with Reverend Helpme Mohrmenin Jowai at the "mother church" of the Unitarian Union of North East India (UUNEI), and met with the UUNEI Education Committee to discuss current needs at the school in Mawkisyiem and deliver a generous check from the "Big Hearts."

The high point of the pilgrimage was the school visit that included speeches, gifting, and a spirited welcome song. More performances took place on the playground outside (click here for video), and a delicious meal was prepared by the mothers and other helpers from the village, after which several home visits were made in smaller groups. On Sunday the pilgrims attended the service at the new church (dedicated in March of 2015), built in partnership with our congregation and named for Hajom Kissor Singh, the founder of Khasi Unitarianism, who was born - literally - just down the road from Mawkisyiem.

Relationships that begin as letters between students and sponsors are solidified by visits such as these, and needs which may not be apparent via email can be more readily discovered. The sharing of time and self on the part of sponsors and students, as well as teachers, is truly a gift that gives both ways. Questions? Contact Cathy Doherty at mysarina@aol.com.
