GleaningsReflections from Rev. Gail R. Geisenhainer, Senior Minister



Dear Ones, All;

Our March worship theme of "Renewal" has given way to a question for April. Who and what do you notice? In the natural world, the winter snow cover has melted to reveal mud and new growth and the general rubble of early spring. Daffodils close to our building on east facing walls are much farther along than the ones on the north side. And "things" are heating up in my email inbox.

Last month I announced that it was time for me to retire. The initial surprise is fading. But I'm noticing it is still a "big thing" in the week-to-week life of our church

community. Folks who speak "systems theory" would say that our whole system is "twitchy." I agree.

When a change this large hits a system, there is a general disruptiveness that is normal and predictable. Folks who are happy with the change get agitated because even a welcomed change can be agitating. Folks who are not happy with the change get agitated because, again, change can be agitating.

All of this is normal. Right and honest though it may be, my retirement notice is a disruption. And disruptions trigger wider disruptions. (Think ripples from a pebble in a pond.) Some of us are angry, some sad, and some elated. And some of us go through those emotions all within a day or a week!

My own feelings are still all over the map. I am feeling the depth of loss. I weep to think of conversations cut off, of not watching our children grow, of not singing with you all each Sunday. I'm feeling timid about the magnitude of the changes on my horizon. And I have moments of deep calmness, the kind that comes from clarity.

There is no one right way to grieve or even to celebrate when change comes. It is really OK to be feeling whatever we are feeling, day to day or week to week. I take comfort knowing that our Congregation has walked through change before. We've been OK before, and we will be OK through this clergy transition as well.

Years ago I had a seminary professor named Harvey Guthrie. (Some of you know him. After he retired from the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass, he came to Ann Arbor to serve at St. Andrews.) Harvey taught us this, over and over, "It's OK to be where you're at."

What I'm noticing as we enter April is how much comfort I'm finding in Harvey's wisdom. It's OK to be where you're at.

Upon Reflection Lindasusan Ulrich, Assistant Minister



As creation myths go, this one was pretty mundane: the yarn was on sale.

I'd just finished knitting a comfort shawl for someone and wanted a particular color for the next friend on my list. When my partner Emily showed me an ad where the yarn I use was half its regular price, I thought, "Oh, great! I'll check to see if they have anything suitable." While the color palette on offer didn't match my next giftee, I figured I'd buy several skeins anyway. Over time, I could build up a stock of shawls we could give to congregants having a tough time.

That's when the creative flutter of a "What if?..." showed up.

I was familiar with comfort shawl ministries from both my home and internship congregations - the church bought the yarn, and people donated their knitting or crocheting skills. Then when someone was grieving, or ill, or going through a particularly rough patch, the person would receive a comfort shawl. It was a tangible way to offer care to one another and a literal embrace of warmth from the congregation.

"What if," I thought, "we try an experiment? Just test the waters and see if anyone is interested in doing this?" Thanks to your generosity, I knew the Ministers' Discretionary Fund - which is intended, in part, to support experimental ministries - was available for the tiny financial commitment I was making that day.

As I shared the idea for my experiment with other staff members, we started generating more ideas for how it might evolve. For example, what if there was an informal monthly gathering where people met face to face to connect and work on shawls together? What about the possibility of making hats for preemies? Their energy convinced me I might be on to something. (I even went back to the store and bought a few more skeins while they were still on sale.)

But I wanted to avoid the temptation to promise more than I could fulfill. If we're serious about making our Congregation sustainable, then we have to take seriously how we allocate the resources called time and energy as well as money.

So for now, let's try this on. I'm delighted that several people have already emailed me about picking up yarn. One inquiry prompted me to find a crochet pattern to offer along with the knitting one. Maybe someone will get excited enough to start that monthly gathering, too. Already the co-creating has begun.

Where are you experimenting these days? How is intentional sustainability showing up for you?

Board of Trustee News

President's MessageBeth Hospadaruk, Board President

Welcome to spring; a time of hope, renewal and change. I hope you have had a chance to review the transition timeline that went out via e-mail a few weeks ago and is also found on the homepage of our website uuaa.org under the Ministerial
Transition Updates link. This link will be updated regularly as we have new information. Regarding change, I have been asked some very important questions. I hope I can answer them here to help you, however, please feel free to contact me or any Board member with other questions or concerns.

"Do we have to have an interim minister?"

1. Yes, while going through the search process, we need



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another minister here to fill that role and work with us to prepare for our next Senior Minister.

"Why does it have to be for two years?"

- 1. The search process for a called Senior Minister takes about 12 to 18 months. There is just not enough time for us to complete that work for the 2016-17 cycle, which starts each spring.
- 2. We need time to say goodbye well to Rev. Gail and mourn our loss of our Senior Minister of eight years.
- 3. During the interim years, our Congregation has an opportunity to reflect, discuss, discern, and decide what we want from our next called Senior Minister. It is a process your Board is committed to doing right and not hurrying through.
- 4. We are in a different position than 11 years ago. We have worked hard to develop a governance structure that works for us. We still have work to do but we have learned from the past, and I am confident that the interim years will be good ones. We will move forward as the vibrant, active, and dedicated Congregation we have been for over 150 years.

"Does this mean Lindasusan will leave too?"

Lindasusan is a hired Assistant Minister with a two year, renewable contract. Her employment is not in jeopardy and is not tied to Rev. Gail's retirement.

To shift gears a bit, I'd like to offer something for you to consider....

When I was gathering information for the Congregational meeting in January, I asked Carolyn Barber to give me facts about our Scrip program. This is a fundraiser for the church. What appeals to me more than anything is that the income earned does not come from our own pockets but from businesses. I was shocked to hear that we only have about 30 members who buy them regularly and from this relatively small group, the church earns \$7000 per year. Just think what we would earn if 200 members or more used the cards - \$50,000! The process is simple: I pay \$50 for a Speedy Gas gift card, I get \$50 worth of gas, and the church gets a percentage of that because Speedy sells the card to us at a discount. SIMPLE. If you buy groceries or put gas in your car then there's no excuse why you don't use these cards. There are many, many other businesses that also participate such as: Whole Foods, Panera, People's Food Co-op, and Ace Hardware. You can learn more here or better yet, stop by the table during Social Hour and talk with Carolyn or any of the other volunteers who do the important work of raising money to sustain the ministries of this Congregation.

September, 2018 | UUAA enthusiastically greets our 13th Senior Minister.

Recognized Congregant team leaders are encouraged to write annual reports. To conserve resources - financial, environmental, and human - this year's annual report will be online only. Each group's report

will appear as a link on the 2015-2016 Annual Report page.

Note: UUAA staff will not be able to provide the same level of detailed editing as in past years, so please be sure to proof each text before sending it in.

Aim for a word count of 250 to 300 words. When appropriate, use a bullet list to encourage others to read what has been shared. Basic elements to include are:

- The recognized team's name.
- The author of the team's report.
- A brief description of the team or ministry.
- A description of how UUAA core values were met by the team.
- Highlights of activities that took place from May 1, 2015 through April 30, 2016.
- Focus on major themes or a few key accomplishments. Each report need not include every detail to give others the flavor of the group's ministry.
- Names of active participants in the ministry.
- Describe future ideas, plans, and goals.
- Submissions beyond a word count of 250 to 300 words maximum will be returned for further editing.

Board Votes Muslim Support at MidAmerica Regional Meeting

Rev. Gail reports this: "At their February meeting, our Board of Trustees joined their voice with the Boards from several Michigan congregations to endorse a statement to be taken up at the MidAmerica Regional Assembly. The Assembly will gather in St. Paul this year. The dates are Friday, April 29 to Sunday, May 1. Registration is now open at MidAmericaRegion.org.

The statement was drafted by clergy of the SouthEast Cluster in Michigan. After all the appropriate "Whereas" clauses, the statement is this:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The 2016 MidAmerica Regional Assembly expresses its love and support for Muslims in our communities and encourages congregations in the MidAmerica Region to

- build bridges of partnership with Muslim neighbors in our local areas;
- increase understanding of Islam within and beyond our local congregations;
- learn more about the realities of religious discrimination and the Syrian refugee crisis; and
- work to foster greater inclusion of all peoples, regardless of their religious, ethnic, national, or racial identity(s).

I am grateful to our Board for encouraging us so directly. I sincerely hope our Regional

Assembly hears this proposal and acts to support it."



Accessibility Team News

The International Council of Unitarians and Universalists (ICUU) 2016 conference will take place in the Netherlands from Sunday, July 17 through Saturday, July 23. The theme will be *Winds Of Change: Global Connection and Climate Change*. What should be a faithful response to the threatened physical environment known as home? What spiritual responsibilities are shared as part of an interdependent web of existence? The ICUU is a network of member groups around the world working to inspire and support each other in building spiritual community.

Els Nieuwenhuijsen, former UUAA pilot test coordinator for the UUA Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry (AIM) Certificate Program, will submit an abstract for a participatory workshop to be presented at the ICUU conference. The title of the workshop is *Climate Change: Impact on Disability Issues and How UU Congregations Can Respond*.

At this workshop, three questions will be explored: What are the major disability-related issues associated with climate change? How can UU congregations develop strategies so that people with disabilites feel welcome and can participate fully? How does this apply to congregations and/or community?

During the workshop, Els will share examples from the AIM program, as well as some of her experiences as the coordinator of the Accessibility Team.

Ele's Place is a center that helps grieving families in the community. They gather in the UUAA home three days a week in the Spiritual Growth and Development (SGD) wing. In the rental contract with Ele's place, UUAA has agreed to help maintain the privacy they promise these grieving families.

To ensure this privacy, all are asked to enter by the main door to the UUAA building on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings and to not enter through the SGD lower entrance. All are encouraged to use rooms in the main building and not to visit or use rooms in the lower SGD wing during this time frame. Those groups that are scheduled in the upper SGD wing may use the main entrance to access rooms.

Let us help to provide an example of the core value of "Community" by providing a welcoming and safe environment where all feel valued and cared for by honoring the privacy that these grieving families at Ele's Place have requested.
