

August 13, 2017 | Teaching the Eye to Hear: The Matisse Jazz Project Service at 10:00am

Christopher Bakriges (pianist, composer, ethnomusicologist) and Gwen Laster (violinist) share original compositions inspired by the scissor cuts of Henri Matisse.

French artist Henri Matisse had rejected faith as a young man, but at the age of 72 everything changed. In 1941 Matisse was near death and bedridden, unable even to pick up a paintbrush, his sole solace for so many years. He found, however, that he could maneuver scissors through prepared sheets of brightly colored paper (what he would call "painting with scissors"). This new kind of creativity amid this strife and his own mortality brought Matisse to what he asserted was "a frame of mind closer to that of prayer."

In the Interim Rev. Doug Wadkins

An important gift of the interim period is to discover together some of the possibilities found in trying different approaches for awhile. Starting in September we will explore a six-month



experiment in which we will utilize themes in the congregation that put us in sync with Unitarian Universalist congregations all over the United States. We will work with the themes and materials offered by the Unitarian Universalist resource, *Soul Matters*. Participating congregations vote on the themes for the coming year and then the professional staff of *Soul Matters* and member

congregations contribute to resources for worship, religious education, and small group ministry that are available to participating congregations. The resources are so diverse that inevitably there are many words of wisdom, quotes, and readings that one would never even know existed. The range of resources has always helped me expand my understanding of common themes that shape our human existence. What is more, there is considerable power and depth in the process of many different congregations sharing their wisdom and experiences as they explore what it is like to live into the themes in the actual context of the present time in which we live. Some congregations decide it is worth continuing that shared experience, some don't, but most feel that the time was well spent. The interim time is a perfect opportunity to see what such an experiment offers to your community.

For six months we will explore the following synchronized themes:

September | Welcome October | Courage November | Abundance December | Hope January | Intention

Secondly, over the last church year, we have explored ideas around worship in a variety of ways. We participated in a lively Q & A session. At that time, many of you offered meaningful thoughts and experiences in our listening circles that focused on the Sunday services. We explored the specific components of worship and the larger concepts that shape that shared time within the services themselves over the last year. Before we enter fully into year two of the interim journey, I would like to offer us another opportunity to think and talk with each other in a spirit of appreciative inquiry about moments when we experience worship as fulfilling our deeper possibilities as a congregation. From the wisdom of these moments, we can reflect together how the values embodied in our practices might guide our understanding for the future in your shared experiences of worship. That shared experience is essential in reflecting and shaping the core values and heart of who you are as a community; it is worthy of our time and attention. I hope you will join us in exploring and growing together.

Quarterly Finance Report

The 2017 Fiscal Year is beyond its halfway point. Once again, an opportunity to assess both revenue and expense is upon us. Revenue is very easy to assess, having only five sources categorized in our accounting system (Annual Pledge, Weekly Collection, Rentals, Fundraising, and Other). Table 1 illustrates that actual total revenue is a little more than 97% of the budgeted value for the first six months of the year.

For the first six months of 2017, the ratio of actual expenses to budget values for each of the three categories, as well as that of total expenses, is illustrated in Table 3.

As indicated in Table 3, expenses are approximately 96% of the budgeted value through the first half of the fiscal year. Community of Writers

Sunday, July 16, five members of the UUAA writers group participated in the Worship Service honoring writing as a spiritual practice. Each of the writers explained why they write and then read a poem or segment of a memoir they had written. Their readings brought quiet emotion, a little humor, and much thought about touching experiences and the deeper questions of life. The service closed with a brief time for impromptu writing by the congregation, which seemed to be enjoyed by all. In the Social Hour after the service many came to the Community of Writers Table to inquire about the Community of Writers and how to join.

Here are a few guidelines: We focus on writing in every meeting. We either bring writing done on our own time or we write during our meeting. We each then read our writing for three to four minutes and ask for comments, as desired. We agree that all is kept

confidential, and our comments are appreciative. We each are welcome to suggest a focus for a meeting and plan a writing activity to explore that subject or a writing form in our own way. Two examples of past subjects are "Social Concerns: what keeps you up at night?" and "How to write your memoir." We enjoy sharing our writings with each other. It is helpful and encouraging to have an audience. We meet monthly on second Sundays of the month from 1:00pm to 2:30pm. Our writers group has given four readings to which the congregation was invited.

Since 2009 we have renovated foreclosed homes rather than building new homes, saving resources and helping to stabilize neighborhoods and rebuild communities, a win, win, win situation.

After the positive results of the straw poll at the June UUAA Annual Meeting, the Immigration Action Coalition is moving forward to prepare for a special fall vote on UUAA becoming a level-one sanctuary congregation. Level-one congregations agree to be ready and willing to physically host someone in sanctuary when the need arises. A Sanctuary

Task Force has been formed and is made up of staff members, the Ministerial Team, the Board, and the Immigration Action Coalition. This task force is working to finalize logistics and legal details in preparation for an affirmative vote. On Thursday, August 24 at 6:30pm, The Immigration Action Coalition is scheduling additional programming on the topic, including listening to a recorded presentation put on by the American Friends Service Committee on how to provide sanctuary, which will include a segment given by Jeanette Vizguerra about her experience when she was in sanctuary in Denver.

Other preparations are taking place as well. Betsy Price is leading a joint effort to make a handmade quilt for our potential partners living in sanctuary. Congregants have been eager to participate and make this physical symbol of caring and welcome. The quilt has been named "The Village Quilt" and is coming along quite quickly.
