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March moves us into another theme drawing from the larger wisdom of our worship team, and the sharing among colleagues of crucial resources needed to address the concerns for the future -- the sorts of concerns that a wide range of you have shared about reaching a particular urgency in your own life and in the lives of people that you care about. After exploring the importance, various pathways of, and sustaining underpinnings of Resistance, we turn our focus to Resilience. We know that this will not

be a time of quick fixes and easy answers. We know that no matter how intentional and wise your choices are about navigating the coming months, that you will grow weary, feel overwhelmed, and sometimes perhaps just plain stuck. We will explore resources both within and around us that restore our strength and renew our higher resolve.

One important source of resilience, and one that we will explore together this month, is worship. In our recent opportunities to speak openly and listen deeply to each other about worship, so many of you in different ways indicated that when we gather for the services on Sunday morning, you are seeking renewal, clarity, and support for the important work of your lives. So we will explore later this month the ways that we best foster worship experiences that offer such possibilities for Resilience. I heard and received many, many comments, that you heard from each other the diversity of needs, expectations, and experiences that most powerfully speak to you in worship. There are some important ways that we can address the range of needs in worship together. Many of you expressed concerns about the length of the services, and over the past weeks the Worship Team has worked with care, intention, and perspective to be aware of service length. We are also exploring ideas about how to best use our time on Sundays. There was also much said about the power of words. The worship team cares deeply about the way word choice is so essential in our diverse community. I think of this area as one of the most crucial places where our resilience, as a community and individuals, is both demonstrated and strengthened in our communal time together on Sundays. There is much rich work to do here, and we are dedicated as religious professionals to exploring it with you. The depth, compassion, and candor of your sharing testifies to the power of worship in this congregation. There is certainly more to explore here than any one service or column can address, but we



will make progress. Together we will work to shape the pathway of its power thoughtfully and meaningfully to empower us to gain clarity, inspiration, and strength for coming days and weeks.

computer to help you and answer any questions. If you are not able to do either, we will accept mailed-in recommendations as long as we receive them by March 31.

We are not only in our own transition of ministerial leadership but also in transition with our nation's new leadership. Of course we are a religious organization that benefits from the laws under 501(c)(3) Tax-Exempt Organizations. There are rules that we must follow to maintain this status. As we work together to fight against policies that we object to and work toward justice on the issues that have meaning to us, we must also keep in mind that there are rules we must follow to maintain this status. The following is from the IRS:

The Restriction of Political Campaign Intervention by Section 501(c)(3) Tax-Exempt Organizations

Under the Internal Revenue Code, all section 501(c)(3) organizations are absolutely prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in, or intervening in, any political campaign on behalf of (or in opposition to) any candidate for elective public office. Contributions to political campaign funds or public statements of position (verbal or written) made on behalf of the organization in favor of or in opposition to any candidate for public office clearly violate the prohibition against political campaign activity. **Violating this prohibition may result in denial or revocation of tax-exempt status and the imposition of certain excise taxes**.

Certain activities or expenditures may not be prohibited depending on the facts and circumstances. For example, certain voter education activities (including presenting public forums and publishing voter education guides) conducted in a non-partisan manner do not constitute prohibited political campaign activity. In addition, other activities intended to encourage people to participate in the electoral process, such as voter registration and get-out-the-vote drives, would not be prohibited political campaign activity if conducted in a non-partisan manner.

On the other hand, voter education or registration activities with evidence of bias that (a) would favor one candidate over another; (b) oppose a candidate in some manner; or (c) have the effect of favoring a candidate or group of candidates, will constitute prohibited participation or intervention.

Our congregation has a very long history of working toward justice, and we will never stop; that is something I am sure of. Let us all do our part to make a difference that matters in this world!

Remarks on Middle East Peace - Sec. John Kerry * Sunday, March 5



Join UUs for Justice in the Middle East (UUJME) in the Fahs Chapel from 1:00pm to 3:00pm to view remarks by outgoing Secretary of State John Kerry, followed by a discussion.

On December 23, 2016, the UN Security Council adopted a resolution condemning Israeli housing construction in East Jerusalem and the occupied West Bank as a "flagrant violation under international law" that was "dangerously imperiling the viability" of a future peace settlement establishing a Palestinian state. The vote was 14-0 with the United States abstaining. Supporters of Israel, including overwhelming majorities in the U.S. House and Senate, strongly criticized the Obama administration for not vetoing the resolution, while Palestinian rights advocates said it was "too little, too late."

A few days later, Secretary of State John Kerry spoke candidly about the dwindling prospects for peace in Israel-Palestine based on a two-state solution if Israeli settlement expansion continues. Questions? Contact Mark Jagner at <u>mjagner@yahoo.com</u>.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)



Now more than ever the work of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) is important. Its work falls into three categories: to promote economic justice, to **UUSC** Is important. Its work fails into three categories of environmental justice. Major protect rights at risk, and to oversee the maintenance of environmental justice. Major efforts in the last month have focused on the travel ban and the various rights

infractions that it has brought about. The <u>UUSC website</u> has a concise, clear description of the events. Also, there is information regarding sanctuary efforts by communities as well as congregations regarding activities to engage in the sanctuary effort. UUSC continues to aid those in detention at our southern border as well as those in refugee facilities filled to overflowing as a result of armed conflict in the Middle East. The ICE comment line number is 202-282-8000 for any who want to speak out personally.

UUSC is also active in the Philippines where the surge of extra judicial killings (EJKs) continues under the "leadership" of President Duterte. Our partner organizations are working to build a coalition of organizations that will be brave enough to speak out against the EJKs. These partner groups will continue with their program of trauma resiliency techniques, which were initiated after the 2015 typhoon.

Here at home, the work of our Justice Building Innovator Cristy Cardinal continues. The first Examining Whiteness series of workshops was well attended and unanimously praised.
