As I write this, the midterm elections have not yet taken place. In one sense, the outcome is critical. In a larger sense, though, we're still going to have a lot of work in front of us, no matter the results.

Racists have already been emboldened. Sexual assault and murder have gotten a pass at the highest levels of government. Voter suppression tactics are multiplying and transmogrifying. Asylum seekers are having their children torn away from them. Transgender and non-binary people are threatened with

nonexistence.

As we enter a month exploring Memory, I think about the historical trajectory of these issues. I remember that the only way rollbacks are possible is because we've made progress. It has been uneven, frustratingly slow, and imperfect, for sure, but there has been enough forward movement that the liberation genie won't go back in the bottle without a fight.


If we're willing, we can also learn from the past and avoid some of its mistakes. For example, we must prevent totalitarianism (and I use that word quite specifically) from taking hold. We must speak up early and often against scapegoating in all its forms. We must find ways to sustain our spirits for the long haul and not burn out.

When the future asks, "What did you do to stop this dystopia?" how will you answer?

Organizing and Deepening Our Ministry Together



Organizing and Deepening Our Ministry Together

As we move deeper into the fall, there are some beautiful developments beginning to take root, which we collectively hope will help us deepen our ministry together here at UUAA. I wanted to share with you this month a few highlights:

• I have received an enthusiastic response to the possibility of my leading a social justice-oriented seminar/learning opportunity, with an intersectional focus on the issue of migration, culminating (for those who are able) in opportunities to travel to the U.S.-Mexico border as a UUAA delegation, learning first hand from impacted communities at/near the border. I am currently fine-tuning what these offerings might look like in 2019; please stay tuned for more information.

- Rev. Lindasusan, providing oversight to our operations/programs on the staff team, is taking lead in the formulation of operational policies. The first of these, which we have developed together this fall, is a policy on policy formulation, which creates a reliable, transparent process for the creation of new operational policies or the updating of existing operational policies. All information related to our congregation's governance is public, and Rev. Lindasusan can share this new procedural policy with you, if it's of interest.
- The UUAA Board of Trustees and I have consulted on the creation of prioritized goals for the senior ministry for the current congregational year (2018-2019), and a work plan that concretizes those goals. That information is contained elsewhere in this newsletter, for those who are interested.
- We launched the Shared Ministries Team (SMT) this past month, creating a new team of congregational peers who will support us, as a community, by receiving, reflecting on, and responding to individual feedback or questions, in addition to helping us caringly navigate conflictual situations. While this new team is just taking its initial steps, they are already off to a good start in helping us live into these intentions.
- Your clergy and worship teams have been reflecting on how we can deepen and expand the modes by which spiritual content is available to members of our community. Beginning this month (November 2018), we will have a rotating clergy-written spiritually-focused column in our monthly newsletters, which will be supplemented by weekly spiritual messages, prompts, and/or reflective questions that will be shared with the community via electronic fora, initially Facebook. We welcome your feedback on this, as we experiment with ways to effectively provide spiritual content across a variety of generations, often with different communication needs.
- The staff team and several key UUAA leadership groups are doing a close read, in the months ahead, of Detroit-resident Adrienne Maree Brown's book *Emergent Strategy*, a spiritual reflection on the times we live in, and what it means to be human, and a thinker and organizer in community, in the midst of such collective social uncertainty, pain, and frequently conflict. It is a deeply spiritual, gorgeous invitation to ground all we do, say, and are in the very best

of what our human spirits call us to be. I invite you to join us in reading *Emergent Strategy*, should you feel so moved.

It is a joy and a pleasure to be in this ministry with you! As we move deeper into the fall season, may we each continue to find ways to nurture, nourish, and take care of our souls. Our world needs the very best that we each have to offer.

Prioritized Goals of the Senior Minister in Collaboration with the Board

In collaboration and consultation with the UUAA Board of Trustees, Rev. Manish has finalized the following prioritized goals and summary work plan for the senior ministry for the 2018-2019 congregational year:

1) Establish healthy, productive relationships with staff, key lay leaders, and key stakeholders.

- This will be worked on via: one-on-one relationship building meetings with staff, key lay leaders, and key stakeholders;
- attending small group and large group opportunities to meet congregants, as possible;
- dropping in on our weekly Sunday coffee hours, as feasible;
- updating the UUAA staff covenant; and,
- participating in weekly individual and group staff meetings, regular ongoing meetings with the Board President, and monthly meetings and periodic retreats of the Board of Trustees and the Shared Ministries Team.

2) Continue the creation of Sunday worship experiences in which the majority of attendees regularly have a spiritually meaningful and engaging experience.

- This will be worked on by: participating in regular weekly planning sessions with UUAA's Worship Team;
- continuing to deepen one-on-one working relationships and spiritual relationships with members of our Worship Team;
- providing ongoing leadership in Sunday morning worship; and,
- supporting the UUAA Worship Team in articulating and sharing with the congregation the values that the Team is seeking to honor and bring alive through worship.

3) Support the Board of Trustees in developing and implementing a plan that moves UUAA towards articulating a vision for the congregation and, emerging out of that, strategic priorities.

- This will be worked on by: consulting with UUA regional staff and other senior ministers of large UU churches on best practices; and,
- participating in Board planning for and the development of a Board-led work plan that moves the congregation into visioning and strategic priority setting work.
- 4) Establish and support the new Shared Ministries Team.
 - This will be worked on by: creating, recruiting for, and sharing with the UUAA community the development of the new Shared Ministries Team;
 - helping develop operational understandings for this Team, by sharing knowledge, best practices, and guidance, as needed;
 - developing a Team covenant; and,
 - meeting monthly with this team, and regular ongoing meetings with the Team's Chair, to reflect with and support the Team in their response to issues, questions, and feedback.

Immigration Action Potluck & Movie: Lourdes * Friday, November 16



Many members of UUAA and of the Ann Arbor community took action last year in support of undocumented immigrant Lourdes Salazar Bautista. We made calls, marched, and wrote letters to our legislators calling for a stay of deportation for this mother of three American-born children who had been a contributing member of our community for twenty years.

Now, Anthony Collings has made a documentary film telling the story of Lourdes and her family's struggle to stay together. The film was shot in Michigan and in Toluca, Mexico after Lourdes deportation, showing the effects on her family. Filmmaker Anthony Collings, a former CNN foreign and Washington correspondent, teaches in the Department of Communication Studies at U-M. He will join us to introduce the film and tell how he became involved in Lourdes' struggles.

Salsa and Salsa | Dancing for Social Justice



Those who attended Salsa and Salsa on September 21 at UUAA enjoyed dancing, food, and conversation with old friends and new while taking action to support some of the most vulnerable members of our community.

The evening's first treat was an awe-inspiring Tango demonstration by Sophia and "el Kronox" of the Phoenix Dance Center in Ann Arbor. Later these two made us all look good by teaching us some easy but impressive Merengue steps.

Ticket sales raised over \$1000 for the Washtenaw

Interfaith Coalition of Immigrant Rights (WICIR), a non-profit volunteer organization that supports the undocumented community in Washtenaw County and helps local immigrant families stay together. The Immigration Action Coalition (IAC) that organized the fund-raising event is a UUAA Social Justice group that works closely with WICIR to support immigrants in our community and immigration policy reform.

Between dances, participants wrote over 100 letters to members of Congress in support of a stay of deportation for Francis Anwana, a 48-year-old deaf and cognitively disabled man. Francis was brought to this country at age 13 to attend a school for the deaf. Supporters say a return to his native Nigeria, where there are no services for the disabled, would be a death sentence. Richard Douglass, a

UUAA congregant who has spent significant time in Africa, confirmed the dire prognosis for Francis in Nigeria and organized the letter writing campaign. The letters were sent to US Rep. Dan Kildee (D-Flint), who has introduced a house bill (HR6829) to make Francis a permanent citizen. Because of the public outcry, ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement) announced September 28 that it would allow Francis to remain in the US for one more year while his case is being reviewed.

Your Legacy Gift = 10% match now!

Since 2005 UUAA has received nearly \$1 million from planned gifts. That money has been used to reduce the mortgage, improve our building, and get us through some hard times.

Planned giving means bequests from people who remembered UUAA in their wills and estate plans. Organizing our affairs before death is something we want to do anyway. Having a plan is a great benefit to our families and loved ones. But it is complicated and we tend to avoid it and put it off.

We have a unique opportunity this year for UUAA to earn immediate matching gifts for each congregant who notifies us of new planned gifts. In 2018 (and maybe 2019) UUAA can receive a 10% match from the Unitarian Universalist Association for each new or increased planned gift to the UUAA. A planned gift requires no contribution today, yet we will receive the matching funds already in 2019.

Get this! So far in 2018 our UUAA has received 13 new or increased bequests, with several more in process. That means in 2019 UUA will send us a check for more than \$65,000. This is not a typo!

This matching opportunity is available until December 31, 2018 and may or may not be available in 2019. So let's get started now.

This is a complicated and sensitive subject for sure. There is a lot to sort out. The most difficult step is the first one. Please contact <u>plannedgiving@uuaa.org</u> or one of the Planned Giving Committee Members. We will get information to you and help you every step of the way.
