Memory Loss Caregiver Support * Wednesday, August 7



The Memory Loss Caregiver Support Group, sponsored by the UUAA Pastoral Care Team in partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, meets regularly the first Wednesday of each month from 3:00pm to 4:30pm in the David Room. It is a drop-in group, open to both members of the congregation and the larger community. We encourage congregants who may know a person giving care to someone with memory loss, to let them know that

they are welcome to join the support group.

A support group offers caregivers, family members, and friends of people with memory loss the opportunity to ask questions, share stories, give and receive comfort, and gain practical knowledge. A confidential, positive setting for sharing experiences is known to be an important factor in how well one copes with caregiver stress.

Dialog Across the Divide: Refusing to Be Enemies * Sunday, August 25

Unity Group Rekindled

First Series:

Documentary | Dialogue Across the Divide: Refusing to Be Enemies Sunday, August 25, Fahs Chapel, 11:45am Co-sponsored by the Unity Group & UUs for Justice in the Middle East

The Unity Group is not a new concept for the UUAA. Its origins reach way back to the 19th century, when the "Unity Club" was a thriving community platform to foster interfaith dialog in Ann Arbor.

A number of UUAA congregants recently revitalized the group and are programming its first series, scheduled for the fourth Sunday of each month beginning in August.

With rhetoric for the upcoming 2020 elections already heating up, and many opportunities for discussion on the horizon from social networks to family dinners, this initial series will focus on how to dialog about disagreements and remain in right relationship with each other.

The documentary *Refusing to Be Enemies* features a group of six Arab and six Jewish women who formed the group Zeitouna over a decade ago. The film does not attempt to answer questions of right and wrong, or how to solve the Middle East

conflict. Instead, it offers living proof of how the journey of personal transformation may pave the way to socio-political transformation and peace. Zeitouna often works with the greater community, including the University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University, and with groups across Michigan, the country, and internationally. Zeitouna members will attend and introduce the 58-minute film. A brief Q&A about the making of the film will follow.

The mission of the Unity Group is to offer intellectual and cultural programs that represent a range of religious perspectives reflecting our UU principle of respecting the inherent worth and dignity of every person. The goal is to expand interfaith and intercultural understanding. Of special interest is presenting underrepresented voices at UUAA. Events might include intercultural music or dance, speakers, and more.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)



UUSC at General Assembly 2019

UUSC was well represented at General Assembly (GA) 2019 with two workshops.

The first, "Criminalization of Solidarity, a Global Challenge" was an update on legal struggles of people around the world who are in solidarity with refugees and their plight. There was a report on "No More Deaths" advocate Dr. Scott Watson, on trial for providing humanitarian relief to people crossing the border. His latest trial ended in a hung jury, which will necessitate a new trial. Also, Parker Dieghan, UUSC Abuse Documentation Coordinator, was charged with a misdemeanor for aiding immigrants.

In the second workshop, picking up on "The Power of We" theme for GA, UUSC underlined its major focus of "Succeeding through Partnership." Partner organizations in the South Pacific in general, Fiji in particular, and Alaska seaside communities are being severely affected by rising temperatures and water levels. They are in desperate need of guidance on how to manage their situation. "Are You Syrious" is a new partner in Croatia that is helping to educate refugee children and find gainful employment for their parents. These are only three of the UUSC partners working around the world with grass-roots organizations that are doing all they can in their own communities.

How fortunate we are to have an organization like UUSC, bringing our assistance to a struggling world in the name of Unitarian Universalists. <u>Please join</u> and support this work financially.

Join us at the 2019 UUAA Womyn's Retreat, September 27-29 at beautiful YMCA Camp Copneconic (45 minutes north of Ann Arbor in Fenton). This retreat is a venue to meet other women in the congregation, enjoy interesting workshops, relax, and renew. It is a wonderful

opportunity to reflect, laugh, and connect in a warm and safe circle of women of all ages. Teens over age 14 are encouraged to attend with an adult sponsor.

Nearly a dozen workshops are planned, along with many fun activities. In our "Women's Wares" sale, attendees will be able to view and purchase art, crafts, music, and books handcrafted by other attendees. In addition, we invite women who are licensed massage therapists to bring their table or chair and offer short massages. Or, if you're experienced at tarot or astrology readings, bring your talents to share. These services may be offered for a nominal fee.

Our lodges offer a variety of sleeping arrangements. A separate building has been reserved for our teen attendees, and there's a separate apartment for our nursing moms and their infants!

The registration fee is \$170 (\$125 for ages 14-25). This fee includes lodging, meals, retreat t-shirt (if registered before 9/10/19), workshops, and most activities. Attendees may choose to pay \$10 extra for each of the following: high ropes course, zip line, and climbing wall. Scholarships are available -- we ask that you pay what you are able and request our help with the rest. Please try to request assistance before September 10, 2019.
