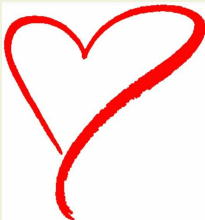

Memory Loss Caregiver Support * Wednesday, September 4



The Memory Loss Caregiver Support Group, sponsored by the UUAA Pastoral Care Team in partnership with the Alzheimer's Association, meets regularly the first Wednesday of each month from 3:00pm to 4:30pm in the David Room. It is a drop-in group, open to both members of the congregation and the larger community. We encourage congregants who may know a person giving care to someone with memory loss to inform them that they are welcome to join the support group.

A support group offers caregivers, family members, and friends of people with memory loss the opportunity to ask questions, share stories, give and receive comfort, and gain practical knowledge. A confidential, positive setting for sharing experiences is known to be an important factor in how well one copes with caregiver stress.

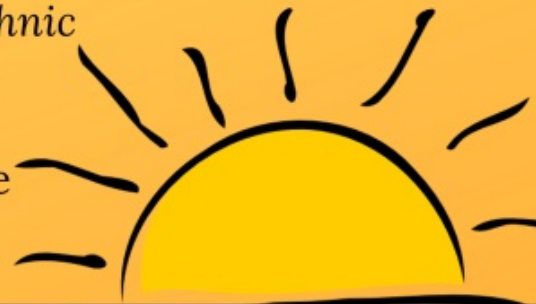

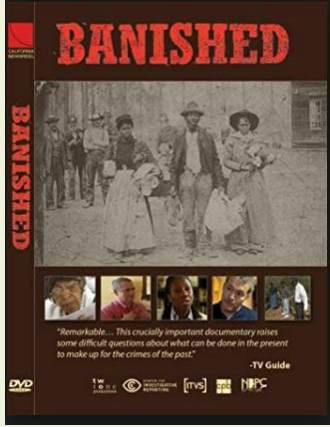

Our lodges offer a variety of sleeping arrangements. A separate building has been reserved for our teen attendees, and there's a separate apartment for our nursing moms and their infants!

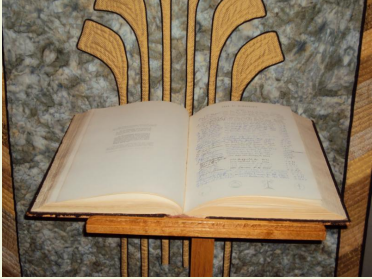

What Do You Know About Viola Liuzzo?

One of our SGD classrooms is named for Viola Liuzzo, a Detroit mother of five who heeded Martin Luther King Jr.'s plea for help after bloody Sunday in March 1965. She drove to Selma and assisted with the Selma to Montgomery Freedom March. While driving a march participant back to Selma, she was killed by the KKK.

A park in west Detroit was dedicated to her in 1982. This summer a statue of Viola was dedicated in the park.

Congregants and participants in UUA's Challenging Racism group, Margaret Pekarek and Kathy McLean recently spent a morning at the park admiring the statue and exploring the park.

Both felt blessed that Mr. Johnson saw them from his home across from the statue and came over to talk. He is the president of the Viola Liuzzo Park Association and taught them a lot about the history of the park and the story of the statue. He was able to contact all five of Viola's children, and all came for the dedication. It was an inspirational morning, and Margaret and Kathy recommend a visit to the park.

Social Justice Council Reports on Statements of Immediate Witness

Delegates at the 2019 General Assembly (GA) in Spokane, Washington voted to approve three Statements of Immediate Witness that call attention to specific social justice issues that UU congregations are urged to advocate for with their voices, their money, and their votes.

Statement One denounces the existence of ICE and calls for the humane treatment of migrant families, including reunification of children with their families and ending the policy of incarcerating asylum seekers. It advocates for comprehensive, humane immigration reform, building accountable relationships with immigrant-led groups, supporting what they request without usurping leadership. UUAA can be proud of its sanctuary commitment, its multi-year support of the Washtenaw Interfaith Coalition for Immigrant Rights (WICIR), and its two border vigil trips.

Statement Two pledges direct and tangible support for local indigenous movements that seek to protect the environment and restore traditional ways of life. Statement Two goes on to urge the UUA to supply educational and curriculum development materials, and support networking among UU's working in solidarity with Water Protectors.

Representatives of the UUAA congregation have traveled to Standing Rock and stayed to support the water protectors. Upon their return, they worked to educate congregants.

Statement Three encourages UUs to get more deeply involved in direct prison ministry by organizing congregational efforts to network with others engaged in ministry programs within prisons, encouraging pen pal programs, and welcoming post-incarcerated persons into your congregation. UUs are urged to educate

themselves on the adverse impacts of prison privatization, the disproportionate incarceration of marginalized groups, the damaging conditions of solitary confinement, voter disenfranchisement, and employment discrimination.

The UUAA Congregation is a founding member of the Friends of Restorative Justice Organization (FORJ) -- an interfaith community coalition whose members work with the Women Lifers Organization at the Women's Huron Valley Prison -- the State's only women's prison located in nearby Pittsfield Township. FORJ is also committed to educate Washtenaw County voters about the need to elect a progressive county prosecutor to reduce the over reliance on incarceration to solve criminal justice issues.

UUSC Partners to Address Race and Immigration

Through Love Resists, UUSC is supporting an organization called UndocuBlacknetwork, UBN, which encapsulates the immigrant "problem" and the black "problem". The organization works to bring a wider awareness to the plight of black people who are undocumented, those who are Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), Temporary Protected Status (TPS), or Deferred Enforced Departure (DED). Because of the color of their skin, they are not only subject to pervasive targeting and criminalization -- not unlike our own citizen black community members -- but also subject to deportation. The group has been instrumental in introducing legislation, creating a guide for mental health specialists, and setting up a meeting place for black undocumented people. Immigration and its accompanying problems move us to compassion and calls for justice.

Beware of Suspicious Emails

What Is Phishing?

There is an email scam that has been going around local churches and universities. I got an email that looked like it came from a congregation member, but the reply-to address was changed. It was a pretty short and convincing message asking for help. Once I replied, I could tell right away this was phishing:

Example of a Suspicious Email

"I am sorry for bothering you with this mail, I need to get an iTunes gift card for my Niece, Its her birthday but i can't do this now because I'm currently traveling and i tried purchasing online but unfortunately no luck with that. Can you get it from any store around you? I'll pay back as soon as i am back. Kindly let me know if you can handle this. Await your soonest response."

Why Is This Suspicious?

- When someone online asks you for a gift card or Bitcoin you must be suspicious. A credit card is more secure actually, because fraudulent charges can be investigated and reversed.
- There are parts of this message that I wouldn't associate with mainstream American English, specifically beginning a sentence with "Kindly" instead of "Please." And the sentence "Awaiting your soonest response" or something equally as unusual is surely an indication that this message originated outside the US.
- This might be advanced, but the email address looked like it was my friend, but in fact the address to reply to was slightly different.

If You Find Out Someone Is Impersonating You in an Email Request

If a friend tells you that they received a message from you that you did not send, change your email password to a password you have not used before. Using a combination of capital and lower case letters as well as numbers, and even symbols helps. One way to do this is to think of a phrase, such as:

"Bringing unitarian and universalism to Ann Arbor for 155 years"

Which can be shortened to

Bu+u2AA4155y
