Board of Trustees Updates

Absentee Voting Added to UUAA Bylaws

At the June 2 Annual Meeting, the UUAA membership voted (116 for, 30 against) to change our congregational bylaws and allow absentee voting for some votes at congregational meetings. The Board of Trustees will now develop and solicit member feedback on a process for distributing and casting ballots for votes the Board decides are appropriate for absentee voting. In a separate vote on June 2, the membership did NOT approve a bylaw change to allow proxy voting (81 for, 55 against, with a two-thirds majority needed). UUAA entered a new chapter last year with the call of our Senior Minister, Reverend Manish Mishra-Marzetti. This significant transition was a natural time to look inward and forward for a deeper recognition of our shared values and vision, both for today and for the coming generations. This is the goal of UUAA's Vision 20/50 process, officially launched in January of this year at our Winter Congregational Meeting.

Working with Elandria Williams, co-moderator of the UUA and expert in consensus-based organizational change, a Design Charette was held in March to gather ideas and refine project objectives. From this learning and additional planning sessions, a process outline has been developed that will guide the project to completion.

Vision 20/50 is now in recruitment mode for the many volunteers whose

contributions will ensure success. Teams are being formed around planning and oversight, member engagement, communications, and data tracking. These teams will develop the tools, people, and processes for engaging our community in radical listening this coming fall.

On May 18, we started working on our 34th house as part of the Good News House Group, an interfaith group of 17 churches working together with Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley to provide decent, affordable housing for people in need.

We've had three successful work days, with outstanding lunches. Our final work day for the year,

on Saturday, July 27, is completely signed up, but keep checking if you want to work; people sometimes need to cancel.

To supplement working on the houses, we are excited to offer a new community outreach volunteer opportunity, helping support the 3rd Annual Sugarbrook Neighborhood Youth Day. The event is organized by a Sugarbrook Park neighborhood parent, and we have been asked to provide some helpers. The park is near a group of Habitat renovated homes and is supported in part by Habitat for Humanity Huron Valley.

Geisenhainer Music Fund



In April, 2016, the UUAA Board of Trustees authorized the establishment of the Geisenhainer Music Fund (GMF) to honor Rev. Gail Geisenhainer, our Senior Minister from 2008 to 2016, who nurtured and supported UUAA's outstanding music ministries during her tenure. The fund's main goal was to purchase a new piano for the Phifer Sanctuary, and the Geisenhainer Steinway Grand Piano was welcomed in June 2016! With the remaining money, there was a desire to support music programs that reached students in the Ann Arbor area--especially those who did not have the financial means to participate.

Earlier this year, board member Lissa Oliver and staff members Ed Lynn, Dr. Glen Thomas Rideout, and Allison Halerz formed a task force to decide how best to embody the spirit of the GMF, and decided to partner with the Community Music School of Ann Arbor (CMSA2). CMSA2 provides need-based assistance to students who wish to play music in ensembles during the school year and over the summer. Their history includes holding classes at UUAA at our former location on Washtenaw.

The GMF will provide three summer and three school-year scholarships in 2019-2020, at the cost of \$2,370. In addition, CMSA2 will receive rent-free space for two

concerts in 2020. This is a one- to two-year plan so the relationship between UUAA and CMSA2 can be developed, and new opportunities for collaboration may be explored. At the end of May, there was \$11,605 in the fund.

Nearly a dozen workshops are planned, along with many fun activities. In our "Women's Wares" sale, attendees will be able to view and purchase art, crafts, music, and books handcrafted by other attendees. In addition, we invite women who are licensed massage therapists to bring their table or chair and offer short massages. Or, if you're experienced at tarot or astrology readings, bring your talents to share. These services may be offered for a nominal fee.

Our lodges offer a variety of sleeping arrangements. A separate building has been reserved for our teen attendees, and there's a separate apartment for our nursing moms and their infants!

The registration fee is \$170 (\$125 for ages 14-25). This fee includes lodging, meals, retreat t-shirt (if registered before 9/10/19), workshops, and most activities. Attendees may choose to pay \$10 extra for each of the following: high ropes course, zip line, and climbing wall. Summer Room Reservations

We began accepting all room reservations for the Summer Program Session on May 1.

As a reminder, the UUAA room reservation calendar system is divided into two sessions:

To submit a room request use the <u>Request a Room</u> link found at <u>www.uuaa.org</u> on the lower right corner of the home page. Completing this form allows us to accommodate accessibility needs, room setup, audio/visual equipment, and special arrangements for large groups.

Starting July 1, 2019, we will begin accepting room requests for large events expecting over 50 attendees for the Congregational Program Session. All other

room requests for the Congregational Program Session will be accepted starting August 1, 2019.

Consider these when planning your event:

- Recurring events are scheduled within each session. If a recurring event flows into the next program session, a new room reservation request will need to be submitted.
- For events expecting 50 or more attendees, allow extra processing time, as it will need to be approved by staff prior to being placed on the calendar.
- Room reservation requests during Sunday Service hours are restricted to those that:
 - anticipate 15 or fewer participants and
 - are timed to allow those participants to attend one full Sunday service.
- The Sanctuary room may be available for scheduled use one hour before and/or one hour after any other scheduled event in this space.
- Check the UUAA calendar as a guide, since other requests may affect your approved times.
