Upon Reflection

When I tell people that part of my job involves developing policies, I think that many assume I must have done something wrong in a previous life to be burdened with



such an onerous task.

I see this work quite differently, though. To me, policies are an expression of covenant. They're how we give our promises a practical form. Dwelling together in peace sounds straightforward - until another group wants the Social Hall for their event at the same time as yours. How will we search for truth in love when weather reports predict a blizzard? We can help one another in raising funds for

good causes, but probably not all in the same weekend.

Policies help us figure out how the 1,000 humans in this congregation can navigate community while stepping on as few of those 10,000 toes as possible.

As Rev. Manish preached a few months ago, UUAA has much catching up to do. Many operational policies haven't been touched in years and are grossly out of date, while others simply don't exist at all. This isn't the work of months, but years.

Since the fall, we've created or overhauled at least half a dozen policies. Several more are in the works. These are living documents, which means that edits and updates are a natural part of the process. We can't afford to let the perfect become the enemy of the good. (You can find the new policies, as well as the procedure used for creating/revising policies, at uuaa.org.)

Writer Anne Lamott tells a story about the time her brother had put off a huge school report on birds until the last minute, and then felt immobilized by the enormity of the task before him. Their father comforted him: "Bird by bird, buddy. Just take it bird by bird." Policy by policy doesn't have the same ring to it, but that's how we'll get it done.

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis. Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX. Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.

Children: 1 or 2 children attending a volunteer slot with an adult are welcome! Alpha House kids especially love meeting other kids during Activity Time. We no longer need to know the children's names or ages. If you plan to volunteer with a lot of kids, please let us know.

Background Checks: When you sign up, there will be a question asking for any adult's full name and/or former name. This applies to everyone who interacts with residents (dinner/brunch servers, activity time). For these slots we must provide our full legal names including any former legal names (such as a maiden name or birth name). When arriving for your slot (everyone except cooks), check in at the front desk where the staff will confirm you have had a background check, or they will complete it on the spot.

FYI: Sometimes Alpha House parents work late, so you might not see as many people at dinnertime (or have as many kids at weeknight activity time). Our food is needed because residents are reheating the food from the dining room refrigerator later that night.

Babies and Bailout Share Back



Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism (BLUU) would like to sincerely thank the UUAA community for the plentiful donations made during Babies and Bailouts! At the UUAA, "End Money Bail Watch Party" there were 25 people in attendance. UUAA also worked with a local donation partner, Metro Detroit Diaper Bank. Our donation drive yielded 4,105 items and \$550!

On a national level, BLUU worked with Allies for Racial Equity (ARE) on a social media fundraising campaign, raising \$8,800 in just 12 days. Those funds were used to release and support 90 black mamas in 34 states.

Community of Writers



The Community of Writers is a group that enjoys sharing their writings with othes! All are welcome to respond to writers with positive feedback. We also include in our monthly meeting discussions of topics such as interesting forms in creative writing and the publishing processes involved in creative writing. During the spring months we

focused two meetings on new aspects of the current creative writing scene.

A few of our members, also taking creative writing classes, suggested "prompt writing," a popular expansive writing method of responding to a topic and incorporating three required words in their piece. Our group found this a productive approach that created dramatic narratives and expressive poems of significance.

A second meeting, by group request, was a presentation of today's publishing business, by Kathy Edgren, our poet who published her latest book, *The Grain Beneath the Gloss,* in 2017. Kathy created a guide to publishing from her personal experience, including cover letter, each journal's specifications, evaluating rejection letters, a bibliography of journals and resources for finding a good fit for your writing, and much encouragement for this unfamiliar business endeavor of publishing. To add to the conversation, Pauline Loewenhardt offered insights she had gained from publishing her memoir in April. Everyone greatly appreciated this firsthand introduction to publishing.

On Sunday, June 9 the Community of Writers will give their formal summer reading in the Jackson Chapel at 11:30am-1:00pm. The congregation is invited to hear the original writings, such as story, poetry, personal essay, memoir excerpts, humor, and flash fiction, of 13 participants in the writers' group, with each writer reading for five minutes or less. Also, the writers welcome all those attending to enjoy coffee and conversation following the reading.

Spiritual Growth and Development (SGD) Wraps Up the Program Year



SGD completed its last Sunday of the 2018 - 2019 year last week, and we celebrated with a well-attended teacher appreciation lunch. We have a lot of people to be thankful for!

In the fall term we averaged 123 children/youth in the building each Sunday, and that number increased in the winter term to 134. We need a lot of teachers, rovers, mentors, and other volunteers to run our classes averaging 34 in class for the fall term and 42 for the winter term. Those numbers would be larger if we included all the overnights, conferences, field trips, and off-site social justice work they

participate in. Yes, we are growing! We have 279 children officially enrolled and so many more new or visiting families attending each week.

Our curricula this year were a mix of tried and true and a little something new. One new class was Picture Book UU for our K-1 class, which helped the children learn about our 7 Principles using beloved picture books. It was popular with both the children and the teachers, and it added many new books to our ever-growing SGD library. Another example of how we're always improving our classes was in Harry and UU for 4th-5th graders. It was taught by a team that included two full-time teachers, who added in nature walks to deepen our connection with our land.

Other program highlights include: 2nd-3rd graders exploring the inner workings of electronics during their "Take Apart Party;" 6th graders in the Building Bridges class racing through a lively scavenger hunt with items related to all the religions

and places they visited this past year; and preschoolers jumping with joy when they saw the tulips they planted in the fall bloom outside their classroom window this spring. Each class had more special moments than there is room for!

Immigration Action Coalition Announces Representatives to Washtenaw Congregational Sanctuary

WCS is a coalition of 13 local congregations that have pledged to support sanctuary as an option for undocumented immigrants in our community facing detention and deportation. WCS is considering expanding its commitment to sanctuary to include support for those seeking asylum. All who are interested are invited to a program exploring the possibilities on Sunday, June 30 from 3:00pm-5:00pm at Church of the Good Shepherd (2145 Independence Blvd., Ann Arbor). UUAA will share our experiences of hosting an asylum-seeker as an example of how a congregation can make a real difference. Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)



Please go to the UUSC website and sign the petition calling for an end to child detention in general and at the Homestead (FL) facility in particular.

UUSC is a cosigner with American Friends Service Committee. Child detention is illegal, which is why Homestead and its antecedent Tornillo (TX) are called "temporary shelters," which they are not. However, there are still 2000 children in "temporary shelters." The Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) is the body governing detention. ORR is demanding fingerprints from people claiming children though they allege that the material is not given to ICE.

When following the money needed to run Homestead, two organizations, Comprehensive Health Services and Hospital Corporation of America (HCA), are both involved. Both have been fined for Medicare fraud in the past, HCA for the largest health care fraud settlement in American history. Also, General Dynamics Corporation has a large contract for training and technical services assistance at Homestead. This company is well known for regulatory and labor violations.

GEO Group, another prison and detention contractor, is implicated in medical neglect, forced labor, and human rights abuses at facilities it operates. It made major contributions to the Trump campaign. It is vitally important to keep a watchful

eye on these facilities and their management teams until these "temporary" facilities are closed.


