The writers will read the diverse original writings they have been composing during the past year and presenting to the Community of Writers' group at their

monthly meetings. These writings will include poetry, fiction (stories and novel segments), memoir excerpts, prose poetry, song, and creative nonfiction. At the Winter Reading the Writers will be pleased to read their work to family and friends and all congregants interested in writing with a supportive, congenial group who share their writings in confidence and encourage each other in the genre each person is pursuing. Following the reading, everyone is welcome to enjoy a time of coffee and pastries and conversation with the writers.

The Community of Writers' first meeting of the new year will be January 19 (meeting every 3rd Sunday of the month). We have shared leadership that encourages members to lead a meeting if they would like to suggest a theme for everyone to develop in their writing for that session, such as a significant event or social issue; an aspect of the writing craft, such as narrative voice or imagery; the pursuit of publishing; and much more. In 2020, we hope to continue our Summer Reading in June, our participation in the Open House of the Adult SGD activities in the Fall, for which we compiled a sampling of our writings volunteered by 13 members, and a further exchange of visits with the Farmington Hills Unitarian-Universalist Congregation's Creative Writing Group. Accessibility and Inclusion Ministry (AIM) Survey Results

Thanks to all of the 87 participants in the Accessibility and Inclusion Survey, which we did at the start of the year. A summary of the results is available online at <u>AIM</u> <u>Survey Results 2019</u>. Many participants felt that we could do more for congregants with disabilities to enable everyone to participate in our spiritual community fully. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 'disabilities' is an umbrella

term, covering impairments, activity limitations, and participation restrictions." It's important to remember that each of us is likely to have a disability at some time or another in our lifetime.

Periodically, we'll highlight an area of the survey to share with you, and we'd love your feedback. AIM will continue its work this year in seeking to help UUAA to become an even more welcoming congregation for people with disabilities.

We invite you to join in this effort. Please come to our monthly meeting on the second Wednesday of the month at UUAA in person or via video conference. Alpha House



Alpha House is a shelter for families experiencing homelessness in Washtenaw County. Four times per year, UUAA hosts a service week at Alpha House. As I write this, our Thanksgiving host week is a week away. Thank you in advance to everyone who volunteered and donated financially! Your donations help purchase food needed for breakfast and lunches during our host week, as well as household cleaners and more. When extra money is donated, we are able to fill emergency needs.

Recently some of these funds were used to buy nursing bras and infant onesies for a shelter mom in her ninth month of pregnancy.

There are dates in December that no congregation is signed up to host. Alpha House staff has requested volunteers to provide meals during the week before Christmas. If you volunteer for those dates, you are responsible for the entire meal, not just one dish, for about 16-24 people.

Dinners families like: taco bar, baked potato bar, baked or fried chicken with cooked greens, lasagna (some vegetarian option please), or pizza and salad.

Brunches families like: pancakes, eggs, sausage and vegan sausage alternative; customized waffles made with your waffle iron, plus bacon and vegan alternative.

As of November 17, there is one vegan and one vegetarian (with tomato and cinnamon allergies) living at Alpha House. Black Congregants @ UUAA (formerly BLUU)



On Saturday, November 2, members of the UUAA community gathered to watch the Black Lives of UU Jordan Harper Memorial Symposium Worship. This event was open to all and sponsored by Black Congregants @ UUAA (formerly BLUU) and the Challenging Racism Group.

Reese Havlatka offered these reflections on their participation: I had the privilege of joining a group of UUAA congregants in streaming the live broadcast of the worship service from the BLUU Symposium. It was a morning of firsts: the first time I had participated remotely in a worship service; the first time I had participated in a worship service led by all Black clergy and religious educators; the first time the Black Lives of Unitarian Universalism had offered a gathering that was open to all. And what a gathering!

When the congregants in St. Paul passed the candle for the chalice all the way around the sanctuary, every hand touching the light, I felt the power of that sacred space echo through to the Jackson Chapel where we stood in a much smaller circle, our shoulders touching, looking for beloved familiar faces on the screen. As a still-newUU, I am still learning the history of the church: its (our) failings, its (our) silences, its (our) long legacy of racism and anti-Blackness. The worship service opened my eyes to both the tenacity of white supremacy culture within the church and the resilience and complexity of Black Liberation theology. Even so, in my own free and responsible search for truth and meaning, I must remember that Black UUs were here long before I sawthem.

We were based in Tucson, traveled to Mexico, and have had it reinforced that racism propels our border policy, reinforcing our overall interest in the intersection of social justice issues. Leadership Development Team (LDT)



The Leadership Development Team (LDT) is launching a process of learning and discernment to inform the congregation about how we elect our lay leaders. Although the bylaws do not specify how many nominees should be proposed per elected position, for many years the practice has been to have a single nominee for each position to be filled. Additionally, the bylaws allow for write-in candidates.

The Leadership Development Team, whose responsibility is to develop leaders, has also had the responsibility of selecting who will be the nominee for each position. At the same time, Unitarian Universalists aspire to use the democratic process in managing their congregational polities. Our congregation has grown in membership and in diversity; these are very welcome changes. The LDT would like to determine whether the current process of nominating leaders is democratic and inclusive. If there were more than one candidate for open positions, would this allow for more perspectives and increased diversity? What are the implications of presenting choices to congregants?

The LDT has appointed a committee to lead an investigation on the matter. The committee's members are Bruce Gibb, Pat Herbst, Elizabeth LaPorte, Terry Madden, and Pete Mooney. They will organize activities to solicit input, including a forum, a questionnaire, and a reporting session. The committee will also contact other congregations to learn how they elect their leaders and why they do it in one or another way. Multicultural Outreach | Kwanzaa



Have you heard of Kwanzaa?

What is Kwanzaa?

Kwanzaa is a pan-African holiday that celebrates family, community, and culture. It was created by Dr. M. Karenga in 1966. The seven-day event starts on December 26 and ends on January 1, 2020.

How is it celebrated?

During the holiday, families and communities organize activities around the Nguzo Saba (The Seven Principles); one principle per day of celebration.

What are the Seven Principles?

Umoja (Unity) Kujichagulia (Self-Determination) Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility) <u>Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics</u> Nia (Purpose) Kuumba (Creativity) Imani (Faith).

One important feature of the celebration is having a Mkeka (mat) in your home where you may place other items such as a <u>Kinara</u> (candle holder), Mishumaa Saba (seven candles), mazao (crops), Mahindi (corn), a Kikombe cha Umoja (unity cup) for commemorating and giving shukrani (thanks) to African Ancestors, and Zawadi (gifts).

Does Kwanzaa replace other winter holiday celebrations?

No, it does not. Many who celebrate Kwanzaa also celebrate other winter holidays or traditions. Many who celebrate use Kwanzaa as a tool to focus on family and community before starting the New Year.

Will UUAA be hosting a celebration?

We are not hosting one this year. However, during the seven days of Kwanzaa, you can check out the Multicultural Outreach page for daily reflections from a UUAA Community member on the Kwanzaa principles and celebration practices.

- Please search the catalog before you decide to donate a book. We do not have room for duplicates.

The Library Committee decides which books to accept; books that are not accepted go on a "free" shelf (above the "returns" and "donations" boxes). Eventually those not taken will go to Prison Books.

Shared Ministries Team (SMT) Charge



"... this is our covenant with each other: to dwell together in peace, to search for truth in love, and to help one another..."

PURPOSE:

The purpose of the lay-staffed Shared Ministries Team (SMT) is to support and nurture the health of the congregation and its many thriving ministries, with a primary focus on operational policies,

processes, and communication.

GOALS:

The primary goal of the SMT is to receive, reflect on, and directly respond to feedback from the congregation related to processes, activities, and communication within the community, with an eye towards supporting and productively enhancing these. Congregational processes, activities, and

communication may include the work of the staff, the lay leadership, or members of the congregation, the congregation's operational policies and processes, and the congregation's activities, programs, and ministries. The SMT honors the confidentiality of its internal reflection and deliberation processes, while committed to the transparency of information sharing and outcomes.

The SMT will serve as an open channel in responding to feedback, questions, or the need for additional information that may arise in our increasingly complex organization, in particular paying attention to areas/issues where it may become apparent that there is a significant critical mass of congregational interest.

The SMT may, at times, proactively survey the congregation and staff to solicit feedback on a particular topic, but it is anticipated that most congregational feedback will be in the form of email, phone calls, and personal communications with the SMT and/or the congregation's staff.

The SMT will work collaboratively with the staff to find a way forward on issues that warrant an adjustment of congregational policies or processes and provide clarifying information to inquiring parties when such would be helpful.

The work of the SMT will reflect UUAA and UU values and the congregation's governing policies, and will seek to strengthen the shared covenant-based fabric of our community.

The SMT members will remain fair and impartial in matters related to congregational life, not serving as advocates for individual congregants, the staff, the ministers, specific program areas of the congregation, or specific subgroups of the congregation. The needs of the UUAA community, as a whole, will always be held first and foremost at the center of all that the SMT does.

Members of the SMT will be selected by the senior minister, who will consult with the leadership of the Board of Trustees and the current Chair of the SMT in the selection process. Committee members will serve three-year staggered terms. The committee will report to the senior minister and will submit an annual report on its activities to the congregation's Board of Trustees. The committee will be composed of members who have broad knowledge of UUAA and its organizational systems, are generally trusted by the congregation and its members, and can be relied on to keep the best interests of the full congregation at the heart of their work. The specific number of committee members will be determined by the senior minister, based on the workload and needs of the team.

COLLABORATIVE ROLES:

While it is anticipated that the SMT will focus primarily on over-arching matters related to healthy processes and policies, it is recognized that there is often no way to discuss processes without also discussing relationships and behaviors within the community, touching on the needs of "right relationship" and the healthy embodiment of our UUAA covenant. As such, while the Living Our Values (LOV) Team has primary responsibility for "right relationship" and covenant-based issues and the Shared Ministries Team (SMT) has lead on operational policies, processes, and communication, it is anticipated that both teams will work as closely together as is needed, modeling healthy, ongoing communication, collaboration, and when appropriate, joint action between the two groups.



Social Justice Council wants to honor and recognize Leah Tame who has served as our note taker for the past two years. Her careful attention to details has served to document our discussion and decisions. She will be stepping down from the council as of the end of the year, and we will miss her sunny presence and the service she has given to the council.

The Unitarian Universalist Service Committee **UUSC** Website suggests many ways that we can take part in raising our voices against the travesty that is our southern border and the issues around immigration.

To stop funding abuse at the border and stop racist immigration bans, please contact our Senate and House Representatives, specifically asking them to back spending bills that lower funding levels for ICE and Customs and Border Patrol (CBP) and to eliminate all funding for Migrant Protection Protocols, e.g., remain in Mexico protocols) and be sure that these agencies cannot shift or reprogram funds designated for other purposes. Also, be aware of so-called invisible walls: the first, safe third-country agreements the government is working on arrange with Guatemala, Honduras, and el Salvador to agree to accept deported immigrants without ever having had an asylum hearing in the US. The second invisible wall bans asylum for anyone who sought asylum in another country and cannot prove that they were denied.
