
## Diaper Drive \* All of March

### Budget & Finance at UUAA \* Answers to Your Questions

#### **Ed Lynn Answers Your Financial Questions**

I promised at the Congregational Meeting in January that I would answer financial questions that you emailed me. Here are the questions I received along with the answers.

#### What is in Worship and Music Expenses (\$23,172 in 2019)?

About one third of this is for guest performers. About half of the total can be divided roughly equally for supplies (e.g., sheet music for a large choir), guests in the pulpit, and music conferences and workshops. Most of the rest is for piano tuning and equipment.

What does Other Employee-Related Expenses (\$48,969) include? Most (60%) of this is professional expense (10% of salary for ministers and lower amounts for other employees), 19% is for employee and volunteer recognition (e.g., traditional Christmas Eve dinner for choir and volunteers), 14% was for the installation of Rev. Manish, and the remainder is our Workers Compensation assessment.

What is included in Fundraising (\$42,588) and Other Income (\$16,334)? Fundraising is primarily the auction (72%) and the scrip program (20%), with coffee and book sales the remainder.

Other Income is primarily money thrown in the donation baskets during Sunday coffee hour (65%), with the rest being memorial and tribute gifts (24%) and other odds and ends. For example, last year we received a notice about a class action suit against a firm sending junk faxes. I filled out the short web application, and received a \$1,000 check, which was booked in Other Income.

#### What is the policy for bequest income?

One third of any bequest is used to prepay the mortgage principal, another third is used for capital expenses, and the last third is used at the Board's discretion, which in the last five years has also been for capital expenses.

#### What is the status of our mortgage?

After the last Comprehensive Campaign, we refinanced with a five-year commercial mortgage of \$1,280,000 at 3.84%. As of February 20, 2020, we have paid down the principal to \$997,856, a \$282,144 reduction in less than four years. The principal should be slightly below \$900,000 at maturity in May, 2021.

### Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)



The <u>UUSC.org</u> website gives us a rich understanding of the work of the organization in human rights advocacy. We need to stay informed, speak out, and contribute financially to strengthen their work and that

of their partner organizations.

Partner organization No More Deaths, founded by members of the UU church of Tucson and supported by UUSC, carried water into Cabeza Prieta National Wildlife refuge in an attempt to help migrants get through this very dangerous area alive. They were arrested for violating refuge regulations. After years of litigation, Scott Warren was acquitted last November. Last month, criminal convictions of four other members of No More Deaths were overturned based on the argument that the government had violated their religious freedom rights.

A second issue covered on the website is the administration's Remain in Mexico Program (also called the Migrant Protection Program), in which those turned back at the border await immigration hearings in Mexico. In fact, it places nearly 60,000 people (including 16,000 children) in grave danger, creates a territory where they face incredible hardship, and provides little to no opportunity to be heard.
